Education Forward DC accelerates the work of visionary education leaders to foster a city of highquality, equitable public schools for every DC student and family.

Our work now builds on progress supported from 2008 until 2016 by the DC Schools Fund, which operated out of NewSchools Venture Fund.

WHAT WE DO

We're focused on the underserved students who haven't experienced DC's progress—yet.

By supporting schools that serve the students left behind amid DC's tremendous overall gains, we can create a strong and sustainable education system for all students in the city.

WHAT DO WE MEAN?



High-quality schools —

those that work to ensure that all students are supported so that they will be successful in their academic and social development.

WHO DO WE MEAN?



Students who are "at-risk of academic failure" — those whose families receive Temporary Assistance for Needy Families or Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program support, are homeless, are involved in the foster care system, or are a high school student who is over-age and under-credited.

Special education students — those students who receive specially designed instruction and related services required to meet their unique needs, as directed by an individualized education program (IEP).

55% of DC's students qualify as "at risk of academic failure" or have special education needs.


DC STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Improving educational outcomes and narrowing educational achievement gaps would significantly increase economic growth and raise government revenues.






DC's gains on the National Assessment for Educational Progress (NAEP) in math have outshone the nation

Enrollment in DC's public schools has increased by more than 25% since 2008







DC has the right conditions for continued reform: an abundance of school choices, strong leaders, a focus on equity and a collaborative spirit.




UNDERSTANDING WASHINGTON, DC'S CURRENT LANDSCAPE

Percent of Public School Students by Need





Funding Per Pupil, 2015





EQUITY, CHOICE AND CITYWIDE COLLABORATION

- My School DC common lottery lowers the barriers to access schools
- Nearly 3/4 of DC families are taking advantage of school choice by selecting a charter school or an out-of-boundary district school
- The city's 118 charter schools enroll 46% of public school students
- New STAR rating system for charters and district schools will look at academic growth and subgroup performance
- Publication of school-by-school equity reports reveals how well all groups of students are being served
- DME's Cross-Sector Collaboration Task Force brings together education leaders, schools, teachers, parents and community members to create a citywide vision and plan for improving the quality of all DC public schools

- Citywide collaboration is always an aim but not always the reality







A GREAT SCHOOL FOR EVERY STUDENT IN DC


To accelerate innovation and improvement in DC's education system, we support a portfolio of schools designed to serve at-risk and special education students well.

We aim to fund 35 high-quality schools across the city to serve 14,000 students at full scale

- Starting new schools where they are needed
- Helping to restart and redesign existing schools to better meet student needs
- Helping successful local charter and district schools grow and expand

As the DC Schools Fund from 2008 until 2016, our investments have helped to dramatically increase the percentage of students attending high-quality charter schools.

A GREAT SCHOOL FOR EVERY STUDENT IN DC: SOME OF OUR GRANTEES

Two Education Forward DC Entrepreneurs-in-Residence are opening exciting new schools in 2018.



Shawn Hardnett's North Star College Preparatory Academy for Boys aims to develop a school environment that reimagines, redesigns, and recreates the student experience for Black and Latino boys.

Hardnett has an impressive background in driving student achievement as a teacher, founder and school administrator within the KIPP network, at Friendship Public Charter School, and at Center City Public Charter School.



Mashea Ashton's Digital Pioneers Academy aims to educate all students, specifically high-need students, at high levels by ensuring all teaching and learning is infused with computer science and coding.

Most recently, Mashea served as the CEO of the Newark Charter School Fund. She previously served as the executive director for the New York Program for New Leaders for New Schools, and as the executive director for Charter Schools for the New York City Department of Education.

SCHOOLS LED BY EXCELLENT PRINCIPALS AND TEACHERS: SOME OF OUR GRANTEES

Grantees are particularly focused on recruiting teachers and leaders of color who share backgrounds with their students.





School Leader Lab provides leadership and talent development tailored to the education sector.

School Leader Lab launched in summer 2017 with our support and is working with principals, assistant principals and instructional leadership teams.

Relay is a national, accredited, nonprofit institution of higher education serving 2,000 teachers and 400 school leaders across the United States. We are supporting its launch of a DC campus to prepare new teachers through a clinical model and work with experienced teachers to obtain a master's degree.





A SCHOOL SYSTEM DESIGNED FOR AND WITH DC FAMILIES

DC schools should reflect the citywide diversity of student needs and interests, so that every student can grow and learn in a setting that works for them.

We are focused on ensuring a better match between the needs of families and the city's schools

- Building capacity of families and the public to meaningfully engage and influence decision-making at the school, sector and city levels
- Building capacity of schools and government to meaningfully engage families and the public with transparent information, proactive forums and ongoing relationship building
- Gathering and disseminating relevant, comprehensive information to support citywide and school-level policy decisions and planning efforts, and families' school choice decisions





A SCHOOL SYSTEM DESIGNED FOR AND WITH DC FAMILIES: SOME OF OUR GRANTEES

Education Forward DC supports groups that ensure that communities and families are partners in creating great schools.





The Ward 8 Parent Operator Selection Team (Ward 8 POST) is a panel of parents who came together to decide what kind of school they wanted in their neighborhood that would serve the needs of both military families and the families in the surrounding community. They issued a request for proposals for a charter school to operate adjacent to the military base in Ward 8. They reviewed these proposals and selected a charter operator that will apply to the Public Charter School Board to open a school.

While a broad range of information about DC schools is publicly available, the data is located in a variety of disparate places and it is particularly difficult for parents to compare schools across sectors. Families are hungry for more user-friendly tools with school information that is relevant to their needs. OSSE will issue a new "state report card" for every public school (district and charter), which will help parents better understand how their students' current schools are performing and inform their school choice decisions.





POLICIES THAT SUSTAIN DC'S PROGRESS

Creating the conditions under which great schools can open and grow.

- Our advocacy strategy is based on building citywide capacity to advocate for policy changes on issues that most influence school quality, including efficient and equitable allocation of resources, strong accountability, school autonomy and equity

Education Reform Now is a national nonprofit organization that cultivates and supports leaders who champion America's public school children, and aims to make progressive leaders the champions of high-quality public education.




